But I have a few friends who have stuck by me and they’re like my brothers. Since I wasn’t able to take formal drumming lessons, my friend Anthony taught me and I’ve been going ever since!”

Sure there will always be obstacles, but nothing stands in his way! What is so fascinating about Kim is his unbridled passion for life, music and of course, the ladies. “Chicks like drummers man!” His band’s temporary name “Buried Where You Fall” currently play gigs around town. His leadership skills are about as unique as his personality, “We don’t have just one leader of the band. We all have an equal say in what we play and what we do. It just works better this way.”

When he’s not pounding out the tunes, Kim attends Oakland Community College as a full-time student and is going for a degree in audio engineering. “I want to have my own recording studio someday so I can help other musicians create the kind of music that makes them happy.”
